d) Targeting your search (Complete after Unit 3)


What type of resources are you looking for (journal article, legislation, news articles, books, etc ...)?


By completing this plan you should now be prepared to conduct a good quality literature search. The plan has considered how you are going to search and where, as well as some of the limitations of the search.
